WHAT DOES THE TITLE I PROGRAM LOOK LIKE IN OUR SCHOOLS?

- Structures are in place to support at-risk students and monitor student learning:
 - Students are screened using STAR EL, Reading and Math assessment in Grades K-8
 - Reading Improvement and Monitoring Plans (RIMPS) are developed for each student that scores below a district benchmark in grades KG-3rd Grade.
 - The effectiveness of interventions are monitored to ensure that students are making progress toward grade level expectations.
- Title I funds support improved student academic achievement by:
 - Providing Title I staff to increase the support level for all students
 - Increase the expertise of educators by providing ongoing, highquality professional development
 - Provides valuable resources that assist instruction and intervention

WHATISA RIMP?

 A RIMP is a plan of action used to accelerate a student's learning in order to move toward grade level reading proficiency.

A major component is providing an INTERVENTION:
 Additional, intensive, focused and appropriate
 instruction provided to students who are struggling
 with learning to read and write

Another major component is PROGRESS
 MONITORING: Occurs frequently (weekly, bi-weekly, monthly) the results of this type of progress monitoring inform instructional decisions

TITLE I HOME-SCHOOL COMPACT: SCHOOL

WHAT ISTHETITLE! PARENT "RIGHT TO KNOW"?

Under ESSA, parents have the right to request professional qualifications of their children's teacher(s). This is to inform you of your right to ask for the following information:

A school that receives funds under this part shall provide to each individual parent of a child who is a student in such school, with respect to such student - timely notice that the student has been assigned, or has been taught for 4 or more consecutive weeks by, a teacher who does not meet applicable statecertification or licensure requirements at the grade level and subject area in which the teacher has been assigned.
